## World AIDS Sunday FAQs

### What is Memphis World AIDS Sunday?

World AIDS Sunday is December 3, 2017, a day to raise awareness in the faith community about the Mid-South's HIV/AIDS crisis and to promote the resources available for individuals and families affected by HIV/AIDS.

Faith leaders throughout the Mid-South will show their commitment to raising awareness about the Memphis area's HIV crisis by leading a "Know Now. Live Longer." World AIDS Sunday event in their place of worship on December 3, 2017.

"Know Now. Live Longer." World AIDS Sunday launched in 2011 with more than 115 churches joining together to raise awareness about HIV in our community and share information about the resources available for those who need care.

### What will take place on World AIDS Sunday?

The main goal of the Memphis "Know Now. Live Longer." World AIDS Sunday is to inform congregations about the resources and support available for individuals and families living with HIV/AIDS and to promote awareness of this disease in the community.

Each Memphis World AIDS Sunday event will vary depending on the place of worship and the preferences of each congregation's leadership.

Activities include HIV/AIDS-related sermons, announcements, bulletins and distribution of the "Know Now. Live Longer." materials provided by the Memphis Ryan White Program available for downloading at <http://hivmemphis.org/community-news/materials/>.

# KNOW NOW. LIVE LONGER.

## **Why is Memphis World AIDS Sunday important to Memphis and its surrounding counties in Tennessee, Arkansas and Mississippi?**

The Memphis area is experiencing a crisis when it comes to HIV/AIDS:

- Memphis has the 8<sup>th</sup> highest estimated HIV incidence rate in the U.S. (2015)
- By the end of 2016, there were 7,426 reported cases of HIV/AIDS in the Memphis area; African-Americans accounted for 82 percent of those cases.
- Young people ages 15 to 34 accounted for 63 percent of all new HIV cases in 2016
- In 2016, 80 percent of all new HIV diagnoses in the Memphis area were among males.
- In 2016, 48 percent of individuals living with HIV were age 45 years or older.

Although there is no cure for HIV, the disease is not a death sentence.

With treatment and proper care, an individual living with HIV can expect to live a long and healthy life. Treatment also reduces transmission rates.

Despite these advances, an estimated 47 percent of HIV-positive Memphis-area residents are not seeking treatment for the disease. One in ten residents who have HIV is unaware of their infection. This needs to change.

## **Why are Memphis-area congregations assisting with Memphis World AIDS Sunday?**

There is a strong connection between Memphis-area residents and their places of worship.

Faith leaders provide guidance on a variety of issues, including health care. They serve the community, help find solutions and promote a safe, healthy community for all.

HIV/AIDS is a crisis impacting our community that calls for communitywide support to reduce the impact of this disease.

With the assistance of faith leaders, the Memphis Ryan White Program can reach members of the community who are struggling with HIV or know someone infected or affected by HIV. Faith leaders have the ability to direct those individuals to seek the assistance and services.

Congregation members care for their fellow community members and can be excellent resources when it comes to spreading the word about these services.



### **How can I get involved in Memphis World AIDS Sunday?**

Faith leaders, congregations and other interested individuals can encourage their places of worship to participate in World AIDS Sunday. “Know Now. Live Longer.” materials are available for download at <http://hivmemphis.org/community-news/materials/>.

### **Who is coordinating Memphis World AIDS Sunday?**

The “Know Now. Live Longer.” World AIDS Sunday is being coordinated by the Memphis Ryan White Program of Shelby County, a federally funded program that provides free HIV-related care and support administered through area service providers.

The Memphis Ryan White Program assists individuals living in Crittenden County Arkansas, DeSoto, Tate, Tunica and Marshall Counties in Mississippi, Fayette, Shelby and Tipton Counties in Tennessee.

### **What is “Know Now. Live Longer.”?**

Based on the health care crisis relating to HIV/AIDS in the Mid-South, the Memphis Ryan White Program launched the “Know Now. Live Longer.” outreach campaign in 2010 to connect HIV-positive residents with medical and emotional support to enable them to live long and healthy lives.

### Memphis-area Faith Leaders Stand Behind “Know Now. Live Longer.” Campaign to Help Reduce Impact of HIV in the Community

On December 3, 2017, in observance of World AIDS Day, we and other area churches are partnering with the Memphis Ryan White Program and our community’s faith leaders in acknowledging the impact that HIV has on the Mid-South region. With proper care, Memphis-area residents can lead long, productive and healthy lives – they just need to know that care and support are available and where to find them. We can help.

The “Know Now. Live Longer.” campaign, launched by the Memphis Ryan White Program, spreads the message of knowing one’s status now in order to live a longer, healthier life through proper care and treatment. Through the campaign, individuals and families affected by HIV can learn about all the resources available to them.

In recognition of World AIDS Day 2017, **NAME OF CHURCH** will raise awareness about the importance of “Know Now. Live Longer.” and its impact on our community on Sunday, December 3, 2017. We will learn more about our congregation’s role in protecting this community from HIV and ensuring that those who need spiritual and physical help know where to find it.

It is no secret that our city struggles with a disease – one that has for years ravaged this community. The numbers do not lie: Memphis suffers from a high incidence rate of HIV and AIDS. By the end of 2016, there were more than 7,426 reported cases of HIV/AIDS in the Memphis area; 82 percent of those individuals were African-American. We cannot continue to allow HIV to be ignored in the Mid-South region.

This World AIDS Sunday, we join hands with other members of the local faith community and the Memphis Ryan White Program’s “Know Now. Live Longer.” campaign to learn about this disease and how we can guide our brothers and sisters living with HIV to find the spiritual, emotional and physical care they need to live long and healthy lives.
